Hunger is the inability to consume necessary amounts of food for daily sustenance because of the lack of funds and/or access to nutritional food.

Hunger is not a partisan issue.

Hunger affects all 50 states, all Congressional districts, and every country on earth.

Hunger in the United States

- Hunger costs the U.S. healthcare system \$160.7 billion annually.ⁱ
- Hunger costs the U.S. an additional \$18.8 billion annually due to poorer educational outcomes.ⁱⁱ
- 40 million Americans, or 12.5%, are food insecure at some point during the year.ⁱⁱⁱ
- 12.5 million children, or 17%, are food insecure^{iv}
- 40.3 million on SNAP in 2018.^v

Hunger Around the World

- 821 million people around the world experience hunger, which is more than twice the population of the United States.^{vi}
- 150.8 million children are stunted.^{vii}
- Around 24,600 people die each day of hunger-related causes.^{viii}
- 45 percent of deaths of children under 5 are related to hunger.^{ix}

How Hunger Is Solved

- Build political will.
- Create a culture where the elimination of hunger is the everyday norm.
- Create jobs and economic development.
- Provide short-term assistance and aid (Relief); and provide long-term sustainability and self-reliance (Development).
- Educate, empower, and engage all Americans in the fight against hunger.

- The world is making unprecedented progress against hunger, poverty and disease. Our generation can end hunger in the United States and worldwide.

What You Can Do As A Member of Congress

- Meet with Alliance to End Hunger Members to better understand their perspectives and solutions to hunger.
