

Hunger Free Communities Initiative Theory of Change

The purpose of the 2024 Zero Hunger Grant is to advance goals related to the Alliance to End Hunger's Hunger Free Communities (HFC) Initiative. The grant is intended for partners in the Hunger Free Communities Network™ as of 12/31/2023.

The HFC Initiative promotes multisector, collective impact approaches to ending hunger at the local or state level. Requested funds should be used for building organizational or network capacities to engage in systemic change work rooted in equity and community engagement. Ideally, grant funds would be used to support advancement along the Hunger Free Communities Impact Framework or to create/promote a collective impact plan to address hunger. Funds may also be used towards the establishment of new Hunger Free Community coalitions. Conversely, grant funds are not to be used for the provision of direct services.

What is the Hunger Free Communities Impact Framework?

Developed in consultation with Hunger Free Communities Network partners, the impact framework (above) describes movement towards the aspirational goal of creating a hunger free community through multisector collaborations. The goal of ending hunger is achievable but it will require stakeholders from across the food system to work together to accomplish it. A good reference document for this work is <u>A Toolkit for Developing</u> and Strengthening Hunger Free Community Coalitions.

A <u>collective impact</u> approach is encouraged as it brings people together in a structured way to develop a common agenda. It requires all participants to have a common understanding of the problem and a mutual agreement on how to solve it, including outlining the role of each partner in the solution. Furthermore, collective impact approaches are rooted in equity and engage community members in social change work.
